Commendations

On three occasions during the school year teachers are asked to nominate one student in each of their teaching groups who has performed well in respect of the level of attainment they reach, the effort they apply, or the improvement they have made. A commendation letter signed by the Head and Deputy is then presented personally to each student.

Examinations Success

Grades in all subjects taken are aggregated and students are ranked in order of their performance. The top students in each year group receive a letter of congratulations on their achievement.

Annual Awards

In 1999 the first awards were made to all Malton School students who had performed well during the school year. 2001 is the third year of such awards. To qualify for an award, students either gained three or more commendations, or they finished in the top ten in their year group.

A special limited edition of enamel badges is commissioned for the awards, based on the school shield. Even more limited is a new badge for students for whom this is their third year of receiving an award. These students will also receive a book prize this year.

Review of 2000-01

September

- 11 new staff join us - **Mr Chris Creber** to teach Boys' Games, **Mrs Phillippa Dore**, History, **Ms Suzanne Jarvis**, Head of Modern Languages, **Mr Russell Mason** Chemistry, **Mrs Sharon Mort**, Midday Supervisory Assistant, **Mr Cliff Reddyhoff** and **Ms Laura Winter**, Science technicians, **Miss Ellen Sayle**, Head of Special Educational Needs, **Mrs Cath Stone**, Girls' Games, **Mrs Lesley Tanton**, Business Studies, and **Mr David Yates**, Head of Information Technology.
- Students in their final year of GCSE studies spend two days "investing in their futures". In a two-day industry related exercise, the whole year group come to school in business-style dress, and undertake a series of tasks and simulations posed to them by local business people
- Students in Year 12 are the first to embark on the new "AS" courses, typically taking four subjects instead of three. It soon becomes clear that the new schemes place a lot of pressure on students.
- Students step out on the annual sponsored walk at the end of the month. In the coming month they collect a record breaking £4256 in sponsorship.
- The country is nearly brought to a standstill with lorry drivers blockading fuel supplies: local filling stations run dry within days.

October

- 35 students from Year 9 spend a week in Thury Harcourt, Normandy, with the Modern Languages department.
- 24 students from Year 12 spend 3 days at East Barnby (near Whitby) on a Geography field study course.
- 51 students from Year 10 spend 3 days at East Barnby as part of their Geography course.
- 25 students from Year 10 spend 3 days at East Barnby on an Outdoor Pursuits course.
- 16 students from Year 10 spend 3 days on extended Work experience as part of their Way to Work course.
- The School is forced to close to students below Year 11 for a day, as a result of the electricity supply being unavailable in West Wing. Normal lessons continue for Years 11 to 13, but restricted to East Wing classrooms on a special timetable.

November

- Our second Celebration evening is once again a great success, with over 340 guests and students attending. Sixth Formers **Andrew Mitchell** and **Kathryn Wilson** compered the show, with **Jessica Leonard** and **Adam Turner** manning the newsdesk. Musical interludes were provided by **Swinton Excelsior Brass Band**, and students **Laura Horsfall** (singing *My Heart Will Go On*), **Lizzie Stallybrass** (playing a Euphonium solo - *Music of the Night*), and **Leah Jackson-Blake** (a piano solo - *The Girl with the Flaxen Hair* by Debussy)
- Floods hit Malton yet again, the second time in 18 months. School stays open, but some staff and students face 20 mile journeys instead of their usual mile, to find a bridge which is passable. Many houses only recently restored from the 1999 floods are deluged again.

December

- The 27th Senior Citizens Party is held at the end of term, and is as successful as ever. The eldest guest is Mrs Vera Yorke from Fryton, who is 102 years old, and was invited by James Dickinson from Year 8.
- The new House Trophy is awarded for the first time, to Air House. Final results were:

- **Simon Dyson**, who left Malton School in 1994 finishes first in the Order of Merit on the Asian Golf tour, having won three of its competitions during the year - the Macau Open (May), the Volvo China Open (May), and the Omega Hong Kong Open (December) – and grossed \$282,371.
- **Emma Duggleby**, the current Yorkshire Champion, finishes second in The Order of Merit in the English Ladies Golf Association tour, despite missing some late season tournaments due to injury
- Ex Malton student **Clare Wright** (who left in 1995) reaches the semi-finals of Yorkshire Television's Countdown programme, and was just pipped at the "conundrum" stage for a place in the final.

- Students, staff, parents and friends gather in St Michael's church to perform the annual carol concert after much practice and preparation.
- Over 100 Key Stage 4 students, mainly from Year 11 but including some Year 10, spend a day studying poetry at Hull Town Hall. They listened to contemporary poets reading their own work – poets such as Simon Armitage, Tom Leonard and John Cooper Clarke

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January

- 25 students on the Year 11 GCSE Business Studies course, plus 5 from Year 12, set off for two days in EuroDisney, France. They claim that they are visiting the giant theme park near Paris to study the economic management and publicity relating to the business - but they also get to go on all the rides and attractions!
- Sixty students from the local primary schools in Malton, Norton and surrounding villages gather one Saturday for a joint event organised by the Heads of Science at Norton College and Malton School - Simon Carson and Ian Martin. The young scientists build and launch rockets made from tubes, cans and paper on a thoroughly enjoyable morning.
- Three Year 11 students - **Matthew Bulmer, Phoebe Court, and Andrew Ward** - plus one of our ex-students **Siobhan Page** spend two weeks in Kenya at the small village of Nanuki as part of the Ryedale Youth Kenya Group Expedition.
- Macbeth, Banquo and the three weird sisters visit the school, courtesy of **The Traditional Theatre Company**. They perform to Year 9 and 10 students, much as actors would have in Shakespeare's day, with a simple backdrop, and just four actors doubling parts.

- The School receives accredited status for its Work Experience programme from North Yorkshire Business and Enterprise Partnership, verified by the Institute for Employment Studies

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February

- **Delta Sly** saxophone quartet spend a day in school. They start with a concert for all Year 7, 8 and 9 students, and follow up with workshops for GCSE and A-level musicians, school orchestra and individual musicians.
- Olive Irene Kirk passed away on February 8th, at the age of 85. Olive's daughters had attended the school, and she had recently kept up her interest in the School, attending the Library opening and other events, and donating a trophy in memory of her daughter Davina.
- A case of foot and mouth disease is reported at Heddon on the Wall, Northumberland. It is followed by severe restrictions on movement, and culls on a massive scale over the coming months.

March

- A group of eight young scientists from Year 11 spend lunchtimes preparing for a debating competition as part National Science Week. **Jo Savage, Leila Newton** and **Lizzie Stallybrass**, put their argument for an increased reliance on organic agriculture for the UK at the Guildhall in York.

- World Line Dancing champion Rachael McEnaney visits school on a number of days to work with students across the age range. A superb dancer with “stunning good looks”, she seemed particularly popular with the Year 11 boys!
- 30 students, 3 staff and 6 brave (if misguided) adult volunteers set off on the annual ski-trip, this year to Passo del Tonale in the Italian Dolomites.
- Art students are given a boost by the week-long visit of artist in residence, **Vicky Wray**. Her work on transferring computer images onto canvas and experiments with handmade paper are a real inspiration to students.
- Year 8 students **Kimberley Thornley**, **Michael Brown** and **Sophie Jackson** represent the School at a public speaking competition organised by the Rotary Club in Pickering. The team were coached by student-teacher from York University, **Miss Eleanor Shelton**.

April

- Sixties Night - Our annual Easter concert takes its inspiration from the 1960's, with all the music selected from this decade. Seven dance groups, our orchestra, two choirs, a jazz band, electric band "Raith", a string quartet and fashion models all add up to over a hundred students involved in this entertaining and enjoyable event, performing to a sell out audience. Money raised from ticket sales goes towards the purchase of a new PA system for our hall. Well done everyone involved.
- Malton School is one of a select few secondary schools in North Yorkshire to receive one of the new School Achievement Awards from the Department for Education and Employment - recognising improvement in performance in recent years.

- Malton and Norton Rugby Union Club win the Tetley Bitter Vase at Twickenham. The team are led to their convincing 36 - 20 victory by captain **Chris Creber**, who teaches Games at Malton School. Head of **PE Liam Harvey** also plays in the team, as do some of our former pupils.
- For the first time in many years Malton School has a Head Boy and Head Girl. In a return to a long-forgotten tradition, **Phillippa Chapman** and **Mark Wylie** (Year 10) are elected by their contemporaries, with **Sofie Buckland** and **Nicholas Dean** elected as deputies.

May

- Students do well in the National Senior Mathematics Challenge: **Hannah Bramhall** (Y10) received “Best in School” and a Gold Certificate; Silver certificates went to: **Ian Clarke** (Y10), **Anita Cooper** (Y10), **Michael Chapman** (Y11), **Leila Newton** (Y11), **Lorna Vasey** (Y9), **Abigail Clark** (Y11) and **Lizzie Stallybrass** (Y11) and there were 17 Bronze awards.
- The first presentation of the Emma Howard Memorial Prize takes place at our annual Art Exhibition, in memory of a young artist who studied at Advanced level with us from 1997 - 1999. She died tragically in a car crash not long after leaving school. **Kathryn Wilson** (Y13) is the first recipient of the new prize.
- Special days are held for Year 11 and Year 13, who are invited to a farewell lunch following a special photo session to fill the re-union albums of the future.

- Year 7 visit Helmsley and Rievaulx on a History trip, unfortunately plagued by torrential rain
- One of our teachers, **Mrs Jane Wilford**, is elected Mayor of Malton for the coming year.
- Malton Community Primary School officially opens an excellent new ICT suite.
- Year 11 student **Katie Raines** is selected for the England Ladies Under-18 Rugby development squad, attending training camps this summer.
- Year 11 student **Craig Newcombe** finishes his official school attendance with the remarkable record of not missing a single day at school due to illness in the five years he has been with us.

June

- Out of seventy applicants thirty boys and girls lucky enough to be picked from the hat have an exciting day with the Duke of Wellington's regiment at Strensall Barracks. The emphasis is on building self confidence, leadership and team skills as well as giving a small taste of army life. Activities included a death defying "zip wire", command and problem-solving tasks as well as opportunities to tackle a full infantry assault course (including screaming sergeants and mud pools!).
- Students in Years 7 and 8 take part in the National Junior Mathematics Challenge with excellent results: best in School went to **Russell Goddard** in Year 7, who achieved a gold award along with three others – **Robin Goforth** (also Year 7), **Michael Brown** and **Peter Clarke** (both in Year 8). Silver certificates were awarded to **Jack Davies**, **Emma Swift**, **Bobby Goodwill** and **Luke Palmer**, and there were fifteen Bronze certificates achieved.

- In a general election delayed due to foot-and-mouth, Tony Blair is re-elected as Prime Minister, with another large majority for Labour.

July

- Sports Day has to be rescheduled due to bad weather, but the reserve day is as enjoyable as ever. The final results are:

- We say farewell to 10 members of staff: **John Dunstan** came to Malton School when it first opened under its new guise following the merger of Malton Grammar School and Malton County Modern in 1971. He retires as Head of Geography following ill health.
- **Chris Lawes** has worked at Malton since 1976, and retires as Head of Religious Education.

- **Ann Bell** has worked tirelessly in the school office providing support and continuity, and retires this year after 17 years service.
- **Diana Morgan** is changing career, having taught Maths and Science at Malton for 9 years.
- Head of Food and Textiles Technology, **Sue Connor**, is similarly leaving teaching for a change in career; she has worked at Malton School for 7 years.
- **Jill Boothman** has worked in the Food and Textile Department for six years, successfully re-introducing Textiles as a GCSE option. She leaves to work in the family business.
- **Catherine Shawyer** was Head of English for five and a half years, and leaves to take charge of a larger English department at Joseph Rowntree School in York.
- Head of PE, **Liam Harvey**, leaves after three years to return closer to his family in his beloved Scotland, teaching at a school near Dunbar.
- **Chris Creber**, the inspirational captain of Malton & Norton Rugby club, leaves us to teach full-time at Terrington School.
- **Lesley Tanton** taught Business Studies and IT on a part-time basis for one year. She moves to a full-time position in Hull.
- Students enjoy the end of term activities day doing archery, fishing, glass painting, golf, IT, orienteering, rock climbing, trampolining, skiing, or day-tripping to Flamingoland, Lightwater Valley and Wet 'n' Wild.
- Eight students from Year 9 take part in the Ryedale Summer School . They spend two weeks – one in school time, one in their holidays – visiting local employers and taking part in work-related activities.

August

- The heating system in Rooms 1 to 6 in West Wing is renewed.
- The "wing-path" is replaced - the old path was becoming very uneven, the new one removes the dog-leg and takes the path straight from wing to wing.
- Our original computer room, Room 20, is been stripped and new benching, electrics and cabling installed ready for upgraded computers to complement our two other computer network rooms.
- Students receive the first ever AS results, and A-level results come through, though with a small delay for two subjects due to a technical problem.
- One week later our best ever GCSE results arrive, with a record 64% of students gaining 5 or more grades at A*-C.
