These are awarded for good work throughout the year.

Commendations

On three occasions during the school year teachers are asked to nominate one student in each of their teaching groups who has performed well in respect of the level of attainment they reach, the effort they apply, or the improvement they have made. A commendation letter signed by the Head and Deputy is then presented personally to each student.

Privilege Cards

Students are invited to apply for privilege cards. Awards are made on the quality of their application. Attendance, effort, house points, commendations, service to school, responsibility, and participation in school life are all taken into consideration.

Examinations Success

Grades in all subjects taken are aggregated and students are ranked in order of their performance. The top ten students in each year group receive a letter of congratulations on their achievement (the top five in the Sixth Form).

Annual Awards

To qualify for an award, students either gained three or more commendations, or they finished in the top ten in their year group (top five in Year 12 and 13). A special limited edition of enamel badges is commissioned for the awards, based on the school shield. Even more limited is a badge for students who have received awards in three years. These students also receive a book prize.

September 2007

We welcome 10 new members of staff:

To the teaching staff we welcome **Mrs Warburton** our new Head of Science, **Mrs Wilcock** our new Head of English, **Mrs Criddle** and **Mr Belham** join the Maths Department, **Mrs Curran** in Music, **Mr Whittaker** in Design Technology, **Mrs Harmon** in Art and **Mr Hodgson** joins the PE Department. To the clerical and support staff we welcome **Mrs Stirton** (Learning Supervisor) and **Mrs Leeson** (Receptionist/Reprographics). The school population continues to grow with a record 90 students joining the sixth form, leading to a total population of 702.

At the end of September was the first trip to Lightwater Valley to reward those students who had performed and behaved well during the year. The entire theme park was booked for us, so the students could enjoy the day without having to queue. A little wet, but great fun.

Northern Rock is besieged by savers desperate to withdraw their money after it admits it is in financial trouble. And we all begin to understand the term "sub-prime". The Burmese military junta cracked down on pro democracy protesters across the country, killing eight monks and a Japanese photographer in Rangoon. The former rally driving champion Colin McRae and his five year-old son are killed in a helicopter crash.

October

On 10th October we hold the first of the new 'Special Days'. Lessons for Years 7-11 are cancelled and replaced with a variety of activities including a trip for Year 7 to Helmsley Castle; a river study trip and a 'healthy living' day for Year 8; polyhedron building and a university visit for year 9; Citizenship and Science projects for years 10 and 11.

We hold our first Non-Uniform day of the year on 19th October in support of the Laura Crane Trust - a childrens' cancer charity chosen by our Senior Students. **Fiona Marsden** and **Amy Jones**, both in Year 11, are selected to train for the area netball team, whilst William Spencer in Year 7 comes first in the district area cross country meeting.

November

Two of our sixth formers, **James Baker** and **Daniel Pratt** achieve Gold Awards in the Senior Maths Challenge, a national competition.

The 9th annual Celebration Evening takes place. The school hall is packed with over 400 students, staff and guests who watch an evening of news reports, musical interludes, a gymnastics display and a dance routine. Over 150 students from all seven year groups in the school receive awards, as well as the award of special prizes for sport, music, maths, science and a new award for excellence in English. Special guests are relatives of the former headmaster Thomas Arthur Williams who present a plaque in his honour.

The school is represented at the Remembrance Service in Yorkersgate and **Rebecca Clifford** lays a wreath on behalf of the school. On 28th November we host the local heat of the Rotary Young Chef of the Year competition, with 7 students from Malton School taking part. The youngest contestant, **Roxanna Khan Williams** achieves an excellent result as runner-up.

All Year 8 students escape from school, only for one of them to be 'arrested' in Woolworths, as part of an educational visit to Malton Police Station, where they also look around the cells and see a police dog demonstration.

Families are put on fraud alert after the Government admits two computer discs containing the personal details of 25 million people have disappeared.

The missing data includes bank details, national insurance numbers, as well as names and addresses. The good news, Chancellor Alistair Darling assures us, is there is "no evidence" it has fallen into the wrong hands.

December

7A and 7E combine forces to hold two 'Bring and Buy Sales', raising a total of £144.59. This is used to purchase tools and utensils from Oxfam to be sent to villages in poverty.

Parents of Year 7 students are invited into school to meet with their child's tutors and Head of Year and Key Stage. This Year 7 review day replaces the Parents' Evening, and is such a success that it is decided to extend it next year to include Years 8 and 9.

On 13th December the red carpet is laid out for the premiere of the latest film made by the sixth form historians in conjunction with the Ryedale Folk Museum and local primary schools. *The Reskue* chronicled the ill-fated voyage of the Whitby whaling ship The Esk in 1816, and is warmly received by the packed audience.

The annual Christmas concert sees a packed house watch a full programme of music, song, dance (by the girls dance club *and* a boys' trio), and the Sixth Form miniature pantomime - Snow White, Six Dwarves and a Banana.

A British teacher is released after 8 days in a Sudanese jail for calling a teddy bear Muhammad. Pakistan's opposition leader, Benazir Bhutto is assassinated, prompting despair from her followers and widespread despair across Pakistan.

John Darwin, a man believed to have died five years earlier in a canoeing accident, walks into a police station in London.

January 2008

There is much concentration on exams right from the start of term, with Year 13 AS and A2 modules, Year 10 GCSE Science modules and Year 9 sitting their mock SATs. A successful 6th form open evening sees attendance far exceed expectations, and suggests a significant increase in 6th form numbers this year. Climber Sir Edmund Hillary, actor Heath Ledger, and Bobby Fischer, American chess grandmaster and world champion, all die this month.

February

Always a quiet month for news – reports, parents evenings, exams all take place in this short month, made even shorter in school by the half term break.

Shannon Matthews goes missing in Dewsbury, West Yorkshire.

Tottenham Hotspur Football club win the 2008 Carling Cup after beating Chelsea 2-1 after extra time.

The biggest earthquake in nearly 25 years hits England about one o'clock in the morning, measuring 5.2 on the Richter Scale.

March

After much debate, Ryedale District Council finally vote in support of a £1.5million grant to help the school with the development of a community sports centre on the school site. This decision is the culmination of a campaign which has found much support from many areas, most visibly when students turned up to the council chambers in sports kit to show their support for the project.

The Governors approve changes to the school uniform to take effect from September 2008: blazers will be re-introduced, and a modification of the school tie to include the school badge.

Year 11 and 13 are provided with inspiration during the Proms Fashion Show, when local suppliers of such diverse items as dresses, limo hire display their wares in the West Wing Hall on Friday 7th March. As well as helping our students with their prom plans, the event was also raising money for the Sporting Chance Appeal.

A non-uniform day is held on 14th March in aid of Sports' Relief. Students and staff alike are encouraged to walk or run a mile, dressed in a variety of costumes. One of the highlights of the day is the tennis match between Mr Williams and **Alex Carrie** (Yr 10). Having allowed Alex to take an early lead with the first set (6-1), Mr Williams was making a strong comeback in the second set leading 2-1 when the match was ended by the start of afternoon lessons. The staff were, however, victorious in the traditional staff-student football match, winning 3-2. A total of £600 is raised.

The annual ski trip departs for Italy.

Mr G Howard and **Mr P Williams** join us as Learning Managers, and **Miss L Davison** as Lower School Pastoral Officer.

Students and staff celebrate the end of term with two evening performances of music, song, art, dance and comedy, linked by the common theme of 'The Beatles'. There are some outstanding individual performances to complement the excellent contributions from the orchestra, jazz band, choirs and two of the school rock bands. The evenings also provide 15 gifted and talented students from all years the opportunity to showcase the results of their three days' intensive workshop with jazz trombonist **Annie Whitehead**.

7A and 7E are the tutor groups which sell the most PTA raffle tickets, contributing to the £1,600 total and winning for themselves a ten-pin bowling trip later in the year.

We hear that our Key Stage 2 to 3 "contextual value-added" results for 2007 are the best in North Yorkshire and in the top 2% in the country – the result of much hard work by students and staff.

Three teams represent the school at the 'Rotary Youth Speaks Competition' held at Lady Lumleys School.

Writer Arthur C Clarke, film director Anthony Minghella and actor Paul Scofield die this month.

April

The 4th Annual Science Lecture by **Dr David James** concentrated on the Science of Sport, answering such mysteries as why have tennis rackets become so large, and how to take the perfect free kick.

Over two hundred primary school students join our Year 7 and Year 8 to enjoy a series of lectures from the National Science Museum entitled 'Fell the Force', 'Glorious Guts' and 'Super Cool'.

The early morning on Wednesday 30th sees 44 Year 10 History students setting out on the first WW1 Battlefields Trip to Belgium and France. Students see large sections of the trenches, visit Ypres and participate in the last-post ceremony at the Menin Gate; they lay a wreath on behalf of the school and give a reading. 7 Sixth Form students accompany the group to research the stories of the men from Malton who fought and often died in the First World War – the focus of the next History Film.

Tao-Tao, the oldest captive giant panda, dies at the age of 36.

May

Sixth Form students organise a leavers' dinner and disco at the Old Lodge, Malton, to celebrate the end of their time at school. An excellent turnout, including over half the teaching staff.

Year 11 celebrate their end of lessons with a "prom" in the school hall. They dress to impress, with the now customary arrivals in

chauffeur-driven limousine and a vintage car, superb dresses and suits, and impeccable behaviour from all. **Amy Ridley** and **Jacob Hughes** are chosen by a secret panel as the Prom King and Queen. A brilliant evening, concluding with the presentation of a rose to every girl, and many of the boys!

The following day a special programme includes an extended assembly, a reception at morning break, then a souvenir photo session at lunchtime followed by a free lunch provided by the school. The traditional shirt signing is accompanied by hundreds of photographs, and some tears. The afternoon is given over to musical performances, presentations, photo shows, and an emotional farewell to all.

June

Our Annual Art Exhibition is extremely well attended by a most enthusiastic and appreciative audience. Two special guests were John and Vicky Howard who presented the Emma Howard Memorial Prize to **Eleanor Brown**.

The final Special Day of the year sees Year 8 getting a taste of India through cooking (and eating), dance, puppet-making, and a mystery challenge in Geography.

8 students and staff have a trouble-free trip to Wimbledon, (unlike last year!) watching two matches and spotting John McEnroe and Sue Barker in the VIP area.

At the end of their AS exams a group of Year 12 historians fly off on a study trip to Berlin. The focus is on Nazi Germany and the events of the Cold War, including a poignant trip to Sachsenhausen concentration camp. Time is also found to explore KaDeWe, Berlin's largest department store!

On 16 June, 12 AS Geography students set off to Arran on a field trip to conduct a number of coursework exercises including measuring soil depth and trekking up a mountain. The journey home is broken by a stop in Edinburgh for an open bus tour and a visit to the Dynamic Earth Museum.

In the last week of term, 48 students from all years travel down to London to visit the Tutankhamun Exhibition. They have a tour of London and in the evening see a fantastic production of 'Billy Elliot' in the West End.

Zoe Szuman is awarded this year's 'most improved tennis player'.

Annie Bentley beats Esther Quinn in the school tennis tournament, whilst in the Boys' Final, **William Spencer** beats Alistair Fothergill. **Helen Craggs** and **William Spencer** win the mixed double final beating Emmy Hickee and George Moore.

July

The annual sports day is as enjoyable as ever, with 7 records broken this year. Final positions are: 1st Water 994, 2nd Fire 928.5, 3rd Earth 900.5, 4th Air 840.

Chloe Potts, a Year 8 student, wins the Active Kids Get Cooking Challenge 2008. Chloe along with the Welsh, Irish and Scottish winners have their menu cooked by Sainsbury's chefs at Sainsbury's headquarters. Students are then invited to discuss their ideas and choices with the judges

whilst they tasted them. Having sampled Chloe's dish of Oakcliff Pheasant with Ampleforth Cider, Jamie Oliver said, "I'd pay for that in a restaurant. It's so simple but delicious. Come back in three years and I will give you a job." Chloe and Subject Leader for Food Technology, Mrs Leach are delighted to discover that Chloe's entry is judged overall UK Secondary Schools winner out of 11,000 entries. Chloe wins £500 for the school and a goody bag including signed books from Jamie Oliver. As Chloe says, "I've had a fantastic day, what an opportunity. Jamie is so cool!!"

7A and 7E enjoy the fruits of their fundraising labour when they are taken Tenpin Bowling in York for raising the most money in the PTA raffle.

More than 50 students from Years 7 to 13 take part in our 2nd annual full school production – this time of the John Godber play *Teachers* about life in a typical comprehensive school. A matinee performance takes place on Friday 5 July and two evening performances on Friday and Saturday. The audiences enjoy an excellent production but the most amazing aspect of it was that the students have learnt and rehearsed the play in only one week!

We say farewell to a number of staff:

David Ewing, Head of Sixth Form, has been appointed Director of Ryedale Sixth Form having been at Malton School for 37 years. **Jennie Johnston**, teacher of RE and English, retires after 32 years, **Carol Peters**, Assistant Head of Sixth Form and teacher of Maths, retires after a total of 13 years, **David Yates**, Head of IT, moves to Drifffield School after 8 years, **Cara Curran** leaves the Music Department after 1 year to pursue a career in performance, **Hazel Fletcher** leaves after 8 years with the Administration Department, and **Peter Williams** departs from his role as Learning Manager. The last day of term sees the school's annual talent show which proves to be of as high a standard as ever. **Michael Mason**

triumphs with a melodeon solo. **Lewis Delaney, Elliot Johnson and Alistair Quinn** take 2nd place with their rock band, and **Johana Booker** 3rd place, singing 'Imagine' accompanied by **Ben Stubbings**.

Zimbabwe introduces its 100 billion dollar bank note in response to the soaring inflation of 2.2 million percent.

Rafael Nadal of Spain wins the Wimbledon men's final, beating Roger Federer of Switzerland in a five set spectacular.

August

At A Level, the number of grade A's achieved is once again our highest ever, with 42, exceeding last year's previous best by 4 grades, and this from a smaller year group. This represents 30% of the entries – almost one in 3 entries resulted in the top grade.

For the second year in a row the majority of results were at grades A or B. 58% of entries resulted in one or other of these top grades, 5% up on last year's previous best.

At the top of the A grade performances was **James Dalglish**, with five Grade A's. **Richard Calvert** and **Sarah Smith** both achieved 4 A's and a B; **Rebecca Davidson, Rebecca Simpson** and **Emma Marsden** all achieved 4 grade A's, with **Joshua Clarke** and **Lewis McIntyre** both achieving grade A's in each of their three main subjects, plus passes at C and D in General Studies. At GCSE level, we see stars this year: there are more A* grades and more A grades than ever before - 95 A* grades represents an increase of 22 on our previous best (in 2006), and 242 A or A* represents an increase of 41 on our previous best (again 2006). This represents more than a quarter of all entries achieving this level – the first time we have passed this quota.

69% of entries resulted in a pass at grades A*-C, just 1% below our previous best (last year). 6 students gained all grade A or A* results. The best individual performance came from **Tommy Leach** with 10 A* and 2 A's; **Jasmin Asquith** achieved 8 A* and 3 A's; **Fiona Marsden** and **Matthew Wilson** both achieved 8 A* and 2 A's, **Amos Abrahams** achieved 6 A* and 4 A's, and **Lucy Shaw** achieved 4 A* and 7 A's. **Rebecca Hill** achieved 7 A*, 3 A's and a B. **Sam Davies** achieved 7 A*, 1 A and 2 B's, and **Sam Harrison** 6 A*, 4 A's and a B.

The Olympic Games in Beijing run from 8th to 24th August. Great Britain come home with 19 gold, 13 silver and 15 bronze medals, ranking 4th after China, the US, and Russia.

Padraig Harrington wins the PGA Championship, the first European to do so for 78 years.

Mark David Chapman is denied parole for the fifth time after murdering ex-Beatle, John Lennon in December, 1980.
