## Recognising Achievement at Malton School

### House Points and Congratulatory Referrals

These are awarded for good work throughout the year.

### Commendations

On three occasions during the school year teachers are asked to nominate one student in each of their teaching groups who has performed well in respect of the level of attainment they reach, the effort they apply, or the improvement they have made. A commendation letter signed by the Head and Deputy is then presented personally to each student.

### House Ties

Students are invited to apply for house ties. Awards are made on the quality of their application. Attendance, effort, house points (at least 500), commendations, service to school, responsibility, and participation in school life are all taken into consideration.

### Examinations Success

Grades in all subjects taken are aggregated and students are ranked in order of their performance. The top ten students in each year group receive a letter of congratulations.

### Half-termly reward assemblies

Students are recognised for attendance, house points, good records, good performance in a special assembly, where prizes are awarded.

### Annual Awards

To qualify for an award, students either gained three or more commendations, or they finished in the top ten in their year group (top five in Year 12 and 13). A special limited edition of enamel badges is commissioned for the awards, based on the school shield. Even more limited are badges for students who have received awards in three years, five years and seven years. These students also receive a book prize.

An annual rewards trip is organised to a local theme park. All students who have achieved fifty house points, but no significant negatives, isolations or detentions, are invited to go on the trip.,

## Review of 2009-10

### September 2009

- We welcome four new members to the teaching staff: **Ms Goldsmith** in PE, **Ms McKay** in Engineering, **Ms McMurdo** in English and **Mr Scott** in IT.
- The school population continues to grow, with 764 registered, including over 190 in the sixth form.
- The third annual rewards trip took place at Flamingo Land to reward those students who worked well during the year. The weather is fine and sunny all day. Meanwhile, year 7 spend the day taking part in various activities.
- Strong Evidence for water on the moon's surface is found by three separate space-craft based studies.
- Patrick Swayze, American actor and dancer best known for his roles in Ghost and Dirty Dancing dies.

### October

- Ed Balls, Secretary of State for Children, Schools and Families visits the school to meet with year 12 students studying for an A Level in Government and Politics, and to hear about how the Ryedale partnership is working.
- The school is sorry to hear of the death of former teacher Alan Vincent Martindale. Alan spent his entire teaching career at Malton School, starting at the grammar school in 1953, staying on as the schools merged to form the comprehensive Malton School in 1971, and retiring in 1988. During his career he taught Woodwork, PE, Games, Maths, Economics and General Studies.
- The school raises over £725 for Breast Cancer Care.
- The year 7 rugby team beat Lady Lumley's in their first game of the season and then came 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 7 teams in the recent Whitby Ryedale Festival at Malton & Norton Rugby Club.
- Malton School Equestrian Team entered a show jumping competition at Bishop Burton College and came a creditable 4<sup>th</sup>.

- Paul and Rachel Chandler are kidnapped by Somali pirates from their yacht in the Indian Ocean.
- It is announced that Rio De Janeiro, Brazil will be hosting the 2016 Summer Olympics.
- London Mayor Boris Johnson makes a cameo appearance in Eastenders. The episode is watched by 8 million viewers.
- Barack Obama wins the Nobel Peace Prize.

## November

- The 11th Annual Celebration Evening takes place. The hall was packed to the limits, as parents and students, governors and special guests gathered to review the previous year in the life of the school, reviewing one of the most successful years the school has had.
- The school was very well represented by students, staff and governors at the Remembrance Day service at the War Memorial on Yorkersgate. Students from the school were participating in the ranks of the cadets, the scouts and the guides. **Harry Francis**, Head Boy, and **Alex Tate-Smith**, Head Girl, laid a wreath on behalf of the students, staff and governors of the school.
- Malton music students play host to counterparts from Gothenburg in Sweden, a music-based exchange programme.
- Four Sixth Form students entered the Debating Matters Competition held at The Mount School in York. They were narrowly beaten by Harrogate Grammar School.
- The school raises over £575 for Children in Need.
- Year 8 visit Malton Police Station as part of their citizenship module on crime and punishment. Amongst other things, they are shown what equipment the patrol cars use, such as stingers and speed guns.
- South Korea responds in kind when fired upon by North Korea.
- The Prime Minister of Belgium, Herman Van Rompuy, is designated the first permanent President of the European Council.
- Having analyzed the data from the LCROSS lunar impact, NASA announces that it has found a “significant” quantity of water in the Moon’s Cabeus crater.

- CERN restarts the Large Hadron Collider particle accelerator in Geneva, Switzerland; they had shut it down on 19 September 2008.
- In the Philippines, at least 57 are abducted and killed in an election related massacre in the province of Maguindanao. This appears to be the deadliest attack on journalists in recent history.

## December

- Year 8 students travelled to the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough to watch A Christmas Carol.
- The Sixth Form pantomime this year is Lord of the Rings.
- The annual invitation to celebrate Christmas went out to senior members of the local community. Guests were treated to food and drink and entertainment from students, as well as receiving gifts from Santa and his helpers.
- Year 12 Politics students visit Parliament. As part of their A-Level Government and Politics Course, students travelled to London. They were given a guided tour of 10 Downing Street by one of Gordon Browns aides.
- Over 120 students took part in the annual Inter-School Sports Challenge. Students competed against Norton, Ryedale, Caedmon, Eskdale and Whitby schools in Rock-It-Ball, Tug of War, climbing and rowing. Malton came a creditable 4<sup>th</sup> scoring 129 points.
- Malton students were victorious at the KS3 Swimming Competition held at the Malton Pool. There were some excellent races but Malton narrowly gained victory over Ryedale by just 3 points.
- Christmas fun despite the snow. Malton school managed to stage the traditional Christmas celebrations and events, despite the bad weather at the end of term.
- Joe McElderry wins X Factor.
- Rage against the Machine top the Christmas charts after an internet campaign to stop Joe McElderry gaining that spot.
- Tiger Woods announces he is taking an indefinite leave from professional golf to focus on his marriage after he admitted infidelity. His multiple infidelities were revealed by over a dozen women.

- Avatar is released, eventually making over \$2.7 billion, making it the highest-grossing film in history, as well as the only film in history to gross \$2 billion dollars in box office receipts.

### January 2010

- School managed to stay open at the beginning of term four of the five days during heavy snow, but Friday (8 January) was so severe that buses were not running and roads too challenging.
- Parents of students in years 7, 8 and 9 attended the second of our annual Review Days to review progress.
- High attendances at both Sixth Form Open Evening and Year 9 Options Fair.
- Religious Studies students visit Bradford to look at comparative religions.
- The longest solar eclipse in 1000 years occurs.
- Leeds beat Manchester United 1-0.
- Most of the UK are under heavy snow during the coldest winter in 30 years. Snow clearance is hampered as grit supplies run low.
- An earthquake devastates Haiti, with thousands killed and injured and over a million homeless.

### February

- A cake sale was organised to raise money in aid of the Haiti Earthquake victims.
- Year 12 students following the A Level English course enjoy a two-day trip to London to visit, amongst other things, the Globe Theatre.
- 14 music students from Year 10-12 depart for Sweden on the return part of the music exchange.
- **Roxanna Khan-Williams, Kate Ferguson and Ben Stubbings** take part in the English Speaking Union debate in Doncaster.
- 200 primary school students join us for the Primary Dance Festival as the culmination of a programme of dance coaching organised by our sports coordinator Mrs Miller.
- Year 9 Rugby team reach East Yorkshire finals after a clean sweep in their Ryedale Area matches, beating teams from Lady Lumleys, Caedmon/Eskdale, Ryedale and Fyling Hall.

- One of the strongest earthquakes ever recorded, with a magnitude of 8.8, strikes off the coast of Chile. Over 400 people are known to have been killed. The earthquake also triggers a Tsunami across the Pacific Ocean.
- The 2010 Winter Olympics are held in Vancouver and Whistler, Canada.
- The author Dick Francis dies.

### March

- The traditional starting ceremony for a major building project takes place on the school field. House captains and invited guests are present when John Taylor cuts the first turf for the Sports Hall project. John has campaigned for a local sports facility for nearly 30 years and raised over £50,000 towards its cost through the Derwent Sports Association.
- The annual Easter shows this year invites people to the Noughties Night. Over 100 performers take part on the last two nights of term, all of their performances being inspired music from the noughties decade. Music teachers Jessica Kettlewell and Anita Langdale rehearse all the musical groups - including two choirs, orchestra, soloists and two drama groups.
- School receives confirmation of £500,000 funding for a new Applied Learning Centre to be build to house courses in Construction, Engineering, Environment and Land Based Studies, Travel and Tourism and Motor Vehicle Technology.
- Malton school staff and students raise over £1000 for Sport Relief, with various fund raising events including, beat the goalie and the mile fun run.
- Greece's financial crisis exposed.
- Worlds shortest man He Pingping of China 21 dies (2ft 5in).
- The ROKS Cheonan, a South Korean Navy ship carrying 104 personnel, sinks off the country's west coast, killing 46. In May, an independent investigation blames North Korea, which denies the allegations.
- Michael Foot, former leader of the Labour Party, dies.

## April

- **Mr Williams** turns tour guide as 40 Year 10 students plus other staff visit the battlefields of Belgium. The highlight of the trip for many was participating in the nightly Last Post ceremony in Ypres, which commemorates all the soldiers of the British Empire who died during the Battle of Ypres.
- A Level Music students perform an informal concert to record their AS and A Level performance Coursework.
- **Jonathan Drake** and **Josephine Smith** two Year 12 students took part in a government funded trip to **Auschwitz**.
- Well done to Malton School Dance Team, who took part in the North Yorkshire Dance Competition at Escrick School. The dancers were **Chloe Potts, Betsie Potts, Maisie Northing, Imogen Smith, Jacob Tildesley and Jack Batty**.
- A BP oil rig explosion kills 11 workers, spilling oil into the gulf of Mexico and threatening the shoreline and ecosystem of the Gulf Coast.
- 96 people are killed in a plane crash in Russia. They include Lech Kaczynski the Polish President, and many other high ranking Polish officials.
- The first televised debate between political leaders in Britain takes place. Liberal Leader Nick Clegg benefits most with a big surge in his poll ratings following his performance in the debate against David Cameron and Gordon Brown.
- Ash from an erupting volcano in Iceland is drifting in the high atmosphere where most commercial flights take place. All plane journeys are suspended for four days as the ash is extremely dangerous to jet turbines. Millions left stranded.
- Matt Smith stars as the eleventh doctor in Doctor Who.

## May

- Year 13 A Level students finish normal timetable classes on Friday 14 May. They have lessons up to lunchtime, when the school puts on a buffet lunch before they departed to make the necessary preparations for their leavers' ball in the evening.

- Over 70 students plus staff guests attend the ball at The Royal York Hotel in York. The weather was fine and the beautiful surroundings were used to take photographs.
- Head Boy and Girl elections are held in which Year 10 students and staff vote, using a transferable vote system.

- The Year 11 Class of 2005-10 Prom in the school hall is a great success. Students gather in their finest suits and dresses at the school, arriving in an array of transport including horse drawn carriages, a limousine and sports cars. **Naomi Messruther** was crowned as Prom Queen and **Craig Foster** was crowned as Prom King.
- On the following day – the final day in school for year 11 - students attend a final assembly, then have a reception at breaktime, more photos at lunchtime, and a final school lunch provided by the school. The afternoon is filled with entertainment ranging from a violin duet, rock guitar, blues guitar, songs, video clips of students dancing, a video of then and now – year 7 to 11 school photos – special awards, and much more. There are tears at the end of the day as emotions get the better of some students.
- The General Election results in a Hung Parliament. This is followed by five days of bargaining between parties, leading to Cameron forming a Coalition Government with the Lib Dem Leader Nick Clegg. First Coalition in UK since the Second World War.
- Volcanic ash is still causing disruptions to flights.
- Cricket – The ICC World Twenty20 which is held in the West Indies is won by England who defeat Australia in final.
- John Forsythe 1/4/10 (Charlie's Angels/Dynasty)

## June

- Real progress is being made on the Sports Centre as the steelwork is installed.



- On 24 June we held our biggest ever Annual Art Exhibition which was extremely well attended by a most enthusiastic and appreciative audience. **Sophie Thompson** was the winner of the Emma Howard Memorial Trophy.
- The world's longest ever tennis match between John Isner and Nicholas Mahut lasts 11 hours and 5 minutes, finishing 70-68 in the last set.
- The World Cup starts in South Africa as the world listens to the sound of Vuvuzellas.
- The Saville Report on Bloody Sunday forces Cameron to apologise to the families of the victims for their shooting by the army.
- The world's oldest leather shoe was found in a cave in the Vayots Dzor province of Armenia. The 5,500 year old shoe dates back to approximately 3,500 B.C. and is in great condition, due in large part to being buried under a pile of sheep dung.

## July

- More than 50 students from Years 7 to 13 take part in our annual full school production – this time of Lionel Bart's ever-popular "Wizard of Oz". Students learn and rehearse the play in one week!
- On the last day of term the school's annual talent show sees a variety of high quality musicians and singers provide excellent entertainment and a brilliant way to end the school year. The winners were two Year 10 students, **Joanna Booker** singing and **James Poole** accompanying on the piano.
- Students who are selected to represent the District receive their District Colours unless they have already received them in the past. This year we have 20 students. *Athletics:* **Sophie Miller, Harriet Beecroft, Lottie Farrow, Charlie Kirton, Josh Campbell, Maisie Northing and Vue Sumsard.** *Hockey:* **Katie Mitchell.** *Netball:* **Esther Quinn, Lucy Ireland and Emma Bumby.** *Football:* **Will Spencer, Max Fraser, Callum Smith and James Douthwaite.** *Cricket:* **Shaun Harland.** *Tennis:* **Oscar Johnston, James Criddle, Emma Wharrick and Sami Heslop.**

- In the annual tennis tournament at school, the girls' final sees **Katie Mitchell** beat **Emma Wharrick**, whilst in the boys' final **Jonathan Pitkin** comes out on top, beating **Oscar Johnston**. The mixed doubles sees some impressive tennis with **Helen Craggs** and **Jonathan Pitkin** beating **Sami Heslop** and **Oscar Johnston**.
- We had exceptional performances on sports day from many of our participants. Best Effort on sports day this year went to **Katie Ward** for her continued effort in Shot Putt, and best overall performance went to **Annie Farrow**. This year there were 5 records broken, by the following performers **Sami Heslop, Maisie Bulmer, Lauren Kindlen, Annie Farrow and Alex Caine**.
- To recognise pupils in each of the individual sports for their hard work and commitment, the following pupils were awarded Player of the Year. *Netball* **Emily Molloy**, *Rugby* **Josh Raines**, *Football* **Lewis Rawling**, *Hockey* **Annie Farrow**, *Rounders* **Sami Heslop**, *Gymnast* **Katy Bradbury**, *Athlete* **Vue Sumsard**, *Basketball* **Alex Caine**, *Cricket* **Shaun Harland**, *Tennis* **James Criddle** and *Cross Country* **Alex Richardson**.
- The final point scores has Water a clear winner, followed by Earth, Air and Fire.
- We said farewell to **Mr Richard Taylor**, who is returning to university study, **Mrs Jo Myers** who has relocated to Hampshire. **Mrs Christine Edgecombe** came as maternity cover and stayed on within the English Department, she has now gone onto pastures new. **Miss Kim Nicholson** came back to school briefly after maternity leave, and has now left to undertake a PGCE placement. **Jessica Campbell**, one of our Learning Manager Team is also undertaking a PGCE placement within the Drama Department at Norton College.
- We welcome **Mrs Bloxwich** and **Miss England** to the English department; **Miss Cooper**, **Mr Rumney** and **Mrs Robson** to Science, **Mr Bruce** to Mathematics, **Ms Gillick** to the Learning Manager Team and **Mrs Ward & Mrs Brownless** to the Midday Supervisory Team.

- Spain wins the World Cup.
- Wikileaks, an online publisher of anonymous, covert, and classified material leaks to the public over 90,000 internal reports about the United States-led involvement in the War in Afghanistan from 2004 to 2010.
- Scientists in the United Kingdom have announced that they have cracked the age-old riddle, “*Which came first; The chicken, or the egg?*” by discovering a protein necessary within a hen needed to create an egg.
- Alex Higgins, snooker player, dies.

## August

- 2010 GCSE results are once again exceptional, with all key measures of success surpassing our previous best. A record 8 students gained all grade A or A\* results. The best individual performance came from **Ian Mason** with a remarkable 11A\*, and another A; **Alice Thompson** with a mere 10 A\* and 2 As; **Jamie Green, James Douthwaite, and Jenny Hyde** achieved 8 A\* and 3 As; **Aya Abrahams, Jessica Whittal-Williams** and **Robin Adderley** 7 A\*.
- There were many more A and A\* performances – in fact 20 subjects had an A\* result. Over three quarters (77%) of students achieved 5 or more A\*-C grades – up 5% on last year’s previous best.
- At A Level, we saw the first year of results for subjects delivered by the Ryedale Sixth Form Partnership, developed by Lady Lumley’s School, Malton School, Norton College and Ryedale School. One of the successes of this collaboration has been a joint course offer of sixty four courses for students to choose from, and around 340 of the 550 16-17 year olds now stay in Ryedale for their post 16 education each year.
- This year also saw the first award of A\* grades at A Level this year, for which students must achieve over 90% in their final exams, as well as A grade overall.
- We were delighted to see six A\* grades awarded to: **Amos Abrahams**, who achieved A\* in English and Mathematics (as well as three other A grades), **Conor Whittal-Williams** in Mathematics, **Tommy Leach** and **Harry Burns** in Business Studies, and **Matthew Wilson** in General Studies.
- Other top performances came from **Rebecca Hill** with four A grades, and **Sam Harrison** with 3 As and 2 Bs.
- We saw superb performances from the following students at AS Level; **Amy Szuman** achieved a remarkable five A grades; **Alexandra Borrill** and **Kieran Leckenby** each achieved four grade As and a B, **Catherine Sanderson** achieved four As and **Louise Smith** three As and 2 Bs.
- Works started on the Food Technology Refurbishment.
- The Copiapó mining accident occurs when part of the San José copper-gold mine in Chile collapses, leaving 33 men trapped 700 metres (2,300ft) below ground. The miners survive for 69 days before their rescue.

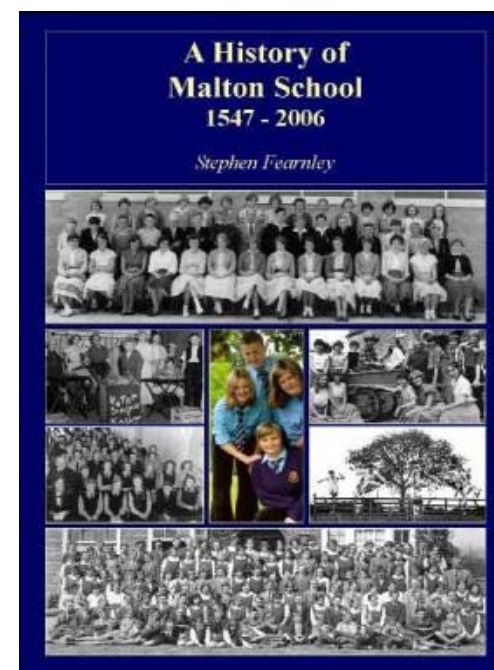
