



**Year 11 Easter Edition**

Welcome to our third exam special, where we address some common issues that occur each year as students approach final exams.

**Exam Timetables**

Personal examination timetables giving subject, date and time for all exams were issued to all students in February. We recommend these are displayed prominently at home—occasionally we have had to wake students from their slumbers to get them in to their exam! Copies can be re-printed if one has been lost, though a small charge may be made.

**Revision Timetables**

We strongly recommend students fill in revision timetables. They should sit down before Easter and plan out their time over the Easter vacation. Two weekly planners are enclosed with this newsletter.

We suggest:

- There should be days when relaxing, and socialising take priority. Some whole days off study are desirable
- A minimum of 3 hours per subject should be aimed for.
- Subjects should be written on the revision planner, and where appropriate the precise tasks that need doing should be noted.

**The Final Term**

We return to school on **Monday 4 April** with six weeks left to the first exam. For six weeks, lessons will be concentrating on completion of courses and revision. We will do our best to make revision stimulating, interesting and varied.

Many lessons will use past papers to provide exam practice, as will associated homeworks. It is very important to do these when set, to gain maximum benefit from the lessons where discussion and review will take place.

On Thursday afternoon 19 May a special timetable will run. There will be an exam briefing and a revision session for the Citizenship exam the next day.

On Friday there will be the exam, then normal timetable from period 3. Normal timetable will continue on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of the following week, interspersed with exams and relevant revision sessions. Full attendance will be expected for these days.

On Thursday 26 May there will be a special programme. Students will be invited to attend in non-uniform, and in the morning there will be a special assembly and a breaktime reception. A photo session will take place at lunchtime, and a special Year 11 lunch will be provided free, and served by members of staff. The afternoon will close with a review of the year, and presentation of progress files, and the Year 11 yearbook.

Friday will be a personal planning day.

We expect students to use the day to plan their revision programmes for half term and until the end of the exams. Students may come to school for assistance with this, or those who have demonstrated good study skills in recent weeks may choose to carry out the process at home.

After half term normal timetable will be suspended. Attendance will not be compulsory other than for exams, but a timetable of revision lessons will be produced, and supervised private study facilities will be made available for those who prefer to study at home.

Full details of revision arrangements for the final weeks will be issued on 19 May.

### Exam regulations.

Students will be given a full exam briefing on 19 May (prior to their first major exam)

Some key points:

- If a student is absent from an exam without good cause, their result is likely to be a U (unclassified), and a bill for the exam entry will be sent home. GCSE exams cost £24 ??? Per subject.
- The only acceptable reason for absence is on medical grounds. A doctor's note must be provided as evidence.
- If a student is unwell but can still attend, they should do so. A special consideration form will be submitted
- If a student is late for an exam, they may not be allowed to enter the exam hall, depending on the time of arrival.

### School regulations

School regulations remain in force during the exams. Normal standards of behaviour are expected throughout the exams. Normal sanctions will be taken against any offenders.

We are currently considering whether to make school uniform optional during the exams. Students have expressed good arguments both for and against relaxing the uniform rules over the exam period: we will consider these views over the coming weeks, as well as monitoring attitude and adherence to uniform rules leading up to the exams before making our final decision.

### Special events The Year 11 "Prom"

The final year of compulsory education is a major landmark in young peoples' lives. In recent years we have established a tradition of celebrating this landmark with an evening event held towards the end of Year 11, organised by the Head Boy and Girl and their deputies. This year the event is planned for Wednesday May 25 (there are no exams on the Thursday or Friday following). The event will be a disco in the West Wing Hall, and students in recent years have excelled themselves by dressing up for the occasion in their suits, ballgowns and evening dress.
