We are holding an evening of poetry with Danny Martin an ex-soldier, poet and teacher who started writing poetry whilst on his second tour in Iraq in 2005. Primary students and our Year 9 students will be presenting the poetry that they have written during the 3 days, alongside that of Danny Martin. This takes place on Wednesday 9th July and the evening starts at 6.30pm in the West Wing Hall. Entrance is free. Please come along to support the children and hear the quality of the work they have produced.

'PARENTPAY'

We have now moved to an online payment system which removes the need to send cheques or cash to school to pay for trips and music lessons.

Many parents are already using 'ParentPay' and are enjoying the benefits of this convenient and easy-to-use method of making payments. If you have not yet activated your 'ParentPay' account you will shortly receive a letter reminding you of your login details so that you can start using 'ParentPay' straightaway.

Using 'ParentPay' for trips means that we no longer require a consent form for each visit your child makes. You will be requested to tick a box giving consent when you make your electronic payment and to complete the simple proforma at the end of the trip letter. We hope this will remove a significant bureaucratic task that many of you have commented upon in the past. You will be asked to complete a rolling consent form at the start of each year and this will be valid for the whole academic year. The only exception to this is for residential trips when we will still require a separate consent form. It is, however, your responsibility to inform us of any changes in contact numbers, medical details, etc.

We hope that all parents/carers will soon be making use of 'ParentPay' and we are planning to extend the system to incorporate cashless catering and other payments to the school in the future.

GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

It has been a busy time for fieldwork in the Geography Department over the last term.

Year 7 students have all been into Malton town centre to carry out a survey of the shops on Wheelgate and compare their results with a similar survey completed in 1996. They have used this data to create graphs, pie charts and a written analysis of their findings.



Year 8 students took part in a series of workshops run by 'Animals In-tuition'. The focus of the workshops was to learn how creatures have adapted to survive in different ecosystems. The students were lucky enough to be able to handle a blue tongued skink, a corn snake, a sugar glider, millipedes, stick insects, a white spotted tree frog and for the bravest - a Chilean rose tarantula. The workshops were thoroughly enjoyed by all.



Year 12 students visited Leeds to compare different residential areas of the city and to see how quality of life can be affected depending on where you live. This was followed by a walk along the canal to look at how successful the regeneration of the inner city has been. We stopped by Bridgewater Place and fully understood why the building has created so much media attention and the neighbouring road has to be closed in high winds. Even on a relatively clam day we were all windswept. A few weeks later the Year 12 students spent an afternoon at Flamborough Head looking at the famous landforms created in the chalk rock. It was fantastic to have the great outdoors as our classroom for the afternoon.

GCSE DRAMA TRIP TO SEE BIRDSONG

On the 26th March, the Year 10 GCSE Drama group went to York Theatre Royal to watch *Birdsong*, a stage show based on the world famous novel by Sebastian Faulks.

Marking the 100th anniversary of the start of WW1, *Birdsong* tells the story of a young English soldier named Stephen as he leads his men through the carnage of the Battle of the Somme and through the sprawling tunnels that lie deep underground.

Throughout the play, the audience are shown flashbacks of Stephen's life, particularly of a love affair he had with a French woman named Isabelle Azaire.

The show has been seen by over 75,000 people and it is obvious why this performance is so popular; it is an emotional drama that draws the audience in and gives them an excellent, realistic perspective on the horrors that the soldiers of the Great War faced. We all had a fantastic time and came away touched and inspired by the performance.

STEPH TRIUMPHS IN TRIATHLON

Steph Bramley, a Year 10 student at Malton School has won 1st place overall in the under 17 girls category at the Yorkshire Regional Triathlon Championships that took place at Queen Margarets School, Escrick Park, York on 30th March. Steph also won the best shoot and best combined run/shoot in her category.

Steph's achievement meant that she qualified for the British Modern Triathlon Championships in Solihull on 10/11th May 2014 both as an individual competitor and as part of the U17 girls Yorkshire team.

Steph came 12th in the country at Solihull. She also competed in the Ryedale biathlon and won making her the district champion. Steph is now looking forward to the Yorkshire Biathlon Championships later this month in Driffield.

Triathlon comprises a static shoot, a swim and a combined run and shoot. In the U17 category the swim distance is 200 metres and a combined shoot and run is 2,400 metres (800 metres x 3 times with shoots in between).

Steph is a member of the Yorkshire Pentathlon Club based at Bishop Burton College and will be taking part in the Tetrathlon competitions later in the year that include the fourth discipline of fencing. Also, after qualifying last November in Solihull, she took part in the British Schools Biathlon Championships at the Aquatics Centre in the Olympic Park in April.

LIVING HISTORY AT RYEDALE FOLK MUSEUM

Tuesday 3 June saw the whole of Year 9 set out on a trip to Ryedale Folk Museum, where they participated in special WW2 activities.

The students were transported back to 1939, where they were given information on what it was like during the war years, among the activities: - dig for victory, make do and mend and a hot favourite cooking with rations. Students packed into the small kitchen and saw first-hand the amount of food which would have been available in the war years. Students were able to taste the two recipes which were cooked over the open fire, fruity potato cakes and carrot cookies, fruity potato cakes was the firm favourite.

The recipes used are below if anyone would like to recreate these at home.

Fruity Potato Cakes

Cooking time 9-10 minutes

Makes 10 small cakes

2oz cooked potatoes
1oz plain flour
½ teaspoon baking powder
½oz margarine
½oz sugar
½ tablespoon marmalade
½ oz dried fruit

- Mash or sieve the potatoes until light and floury; do not add any milk
- Sift the flour and baking powder, mix with the potatoes
- Cream the margarine, sugar and marmalade, then add the flour and potato mixture with the dried fruit

- Mix it together and then roll out on a floured board with a floured rolling pin
- Cook in a greased pan over the fire before serving hot or cold
- Sprinkle with a little sugar if desired.

Carrot Cookies

1 tablespoon margarine
2 tablespoons sugar
Vanilla flavouring
4 tablespoons of grated carrot
6 tablespoons plain flour
½ teaspoon baking powder

- Cream the margarine and sugar together until light and fluffy
- Beat in the vanilla and grated carrot
- Fold in the flour and baking powder
- Drop spoonful's of the mix onto greased baking trays
- Bake at GM7 for 20 minutes.

Y10 BATTLEFIELDS TRIP

A group of forty students recently visited WW1 Battlefields in Belgium and France as a part of their Year 10 GCSE History course. The school worked hard to give the trip a local angle by researching 500 local men who had lived within a 6 mile radius of Malton and were killed in the First World War. Some of these men were relatives of the students and they were able to find and visit their graves or memorials. Often these students were the first members of their family to visit the grave of a relative.

Students were fortunate to visit the Thiepval Memorial whilst the 'Black Watch' carried out a Remembrance service. Two students, Chris Horne and Eleanor Anson, were chosen to lay the wreath at the Menin Gate in Ypres on behalf of the students, staff and governors of Malton School. Students had submitted suggestions for the inscription on the wreath and those put forward by Chris and Eleanor were chosen.

The group visited a number of Cemeteries and Memorials during their visit and these included:

Vimy Ridge where, in 1917, the Canadians had learnt from their mistakes at the Somme and now had creeping barrages and tunnels to move troops closer to the enemy by reducing the width of 'no-man's land'.

Notre Dame de Lorette French Cemetery and National Memorial, where students learned that there were mass graves as well as the identified headstones and that the vast number of headstones did not nearly represent the actual number of bodies in the cemetery.

The Arras memorial where Eleanor Anson visited her relative and the Warlencourt Cemetery where Jessica Hopkins visited her relative.

Ulster tower and museum commemorate the 36th Ulster Division's attack on the German front lines on 1st July 1916, the first day of the battle of the Somme.

Thiepval Memorial where students explored the memorial and visitor centre and where they could research relatives.

The Lochnagar Crater, the largest crater is now a unique memorial to all those who suffered in the Great War. It is dedicated to peace, fellowship and reconciliation between all nations who fought on the Western Front.

The Fricourt German Cemetery illustrated the different nature of a German Cemetery having black crosses and a dark atmosphere. In Germany black is the colour of mourning.

Students took the town walk in Ypres and attended the Menin Gate ceremony.

Merrie Barnett a student on the trip said "We all found the Battlefield trip extremely moving. Each and every Battlefield we visited was not only beautifully kept but also had its own uniqueness to it. We all found it hard to get to grips with the infinite amount of soldiers who gave their life away for us all. It was an unforgettable trip which will remain in our memories always. They are gone but never forgotten".

The group photograph was taken at Rifle House Cemetery, Ploegsteert, near Ypres, Belgium. The reason they visited this cemetery was because there is a grave for a local lad, Victor Gordon Hickes from Manor Farm, Scackleton, who was a relative of former students of the school, so a local connection.



KARATE KIDS!

Congratulations to Joseph Rowland (Year 11) and Maisie Thomson (Year 12) who both won Gold in their Kumite (fighting) categories in the Yorkshire Open Karate Championships held in Barnsley on 25th May. Maisie also won 2 silver medals in the team fighting events. Both train with the Drifffield & Wetwang Karate Academy and also compete as members of the England Karate Alliance squad in National and International events.



MALTON SCHOOL HOSTS OXBRIDGE EVENT

A group of 40 Year 11 & 12 students have attended an event organised and hosted by Malton School to meet representatives from Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Students from Lady Lumley's School and Norton College were also invited to attend.

Dr Joe Organ from Oxford University talked to current students about gaining access to highly selective university courses.

Oxford and Cambridge undergraduates also spoke to students wishing to apply for highly competitive degrees. 95% of the current Year 13 students at Malton School have made applications to university and over a third of last year's applicants gained places at the most prestigious "Russell Group" of universities. This success is built on providing a full range of academic courses to ensure that all Malton students have access to any degree they wish to study for.

Rob Cook, Head of Sixth Form said: "The school has an excellent record of students achieving places at these highly selective universities and we feel that giving students the opportunity to talk to undergraduates helps them immensely in their preparation for university".

Applications for the sixth form for entry in September 2014 can still be made particularly from those students who may find they can no longer access the courses they want to at other schools and colleges.



PARENTS' FORUM

Parents were invited to come along to our latest Parents' Forum in conjunction with Malton School PTA, focussing on careers. Pat Lovegrove (Assistant Head), welcomed parents. Lucy Davison (Head of Key Stage 3), and Rob Cook (Head of Sixth Form), both gave talks on how parents could support their children in career choices and also how the school supports students with their future choices. Gill Tate the Careers Advisor who comes into school to provide careers guidance interviews also spoke to parents. Gill works as part of the Inspire Group. Inspire is a new approach to raising young peoples' aspirations and achievement by delivering high-quality, impartial careers guidance in schools and colleges. Careers guidance is open to all our year groups. We have been particularly focussing on students in Years 9, 10 and 11 and those needing extra support with their career paths whether it be school, college or university. His father was a former rugby player and coached him until he was 13. Most of the kids in New Zealand aspire to play for the All Blacks one day, they all know the Haka off by heart by the age of 10! The Haka is a long standing tradition, first used when going into battle years ago to intimidate the opponents in war, the All Blacks use it before their rugby games!

Kenton enjoys all sports, excelling in boxing and volleyball at school as well as rugby and golf. He plays for the Pirates in New Zealand and when he goes back in December he hopes to pick up with the rugby sevens team he played for - this is one grade under playing for New Zealand!

Kenton wanted to travel and see more of Europe, he came over to England through the Malton and Norton Rugby Club who he has been playing for this season. Although he has been slighted by injury and had to have an operation which put him out for 4 months, he still enjoyed 23 games for Malton and Norton Rugby Club and feels that since his arrival, the rugby club have had a lot more interest in people wanting to play the sport and join the club.

His time at Malton School is spent coaching the rugby teams and supporting PE and games lessons with our PE staff along with lunchtime and after school activities and clubs. He does this on a daily basis, and remarks on how proud he is of the progress that the rugby teams have made whilst he has been here and how much he enjoys coaching the students. He has learnt lots about teaching whilst here rather than just coaching and says he will miss the teaching side. For the first time the school have a girls rugby team who came out on top when they played a friendly recently against Norton College 50 - 20. The Malton RFU are trying to promote girls rugby and get more fixtures for girls teams.

The school is looking to continue its partnership with the Rugby Club and bring another talented southern hemisphere coach to join us next year.

Of Mice and Men

A group of 80 Year 11 students from Malton School recently watched a performance of Nobel Prize-winning author John Steinbeck's 'Of Mice and Men' at the West Yorkshire Playhouse in Leeds.

All students in Year 11 were offered the opportunity to watch the performance because it is one of the texts they are studying for their GCSE in English Literature. The play is produced by the West Yorkshire Playhouse's new Associate Director, Mark Rosenblatt, and was an excellent opportunity for them to see the text in production.

Mrs Bloxwich, English teacher, commented "Having a production of the novel so close to Malton was a fantastic opportunity to help the students revise the key themes and events in the novel, as well as allowing them the chance to gain a fresh interpretation of Steinbeck's work. We were keen for the students to consider the novel in a different format; the play brought the words to life for them, with the musical score and lighting helping to enhance the major ideas in the book".



Twelfth Night

Another group of 29 Year 10 students from the school recently watched Twelfth Night at the Octagon Theatre in Bolton. Set in a stately home in Lancashire, Downton Abbey meets Upstairs, Downstairs in William Shakespeare's tender, compassionate love story: Twelfth Night.

Director David Thacker has an outstanding reputation for directing accessible and dynamic Shakespeare productions with a contemporary and stylish approach. Students from Malton assisted with a controlled assessment task as they saw the text in the performance and afterwards participated in a workshop with the cast members.

These trips are part of an extensive programme of trips and visits provided by the school every year to enrich the learning experience of students.

Another block they visited was called Ferens, which has been named after one of the donators who helped to raise money to build the university in 1927, Thomas Robinson Ferens. Along with a massive range of courses there are also a number of faculties which are based in the heart of the university, including, Arts and Social Sciences, Health and Social Care, Science and Engineering, Hull University Business School and Hull York University Medical School.

The students had a really great day, thank you to Hull University for having us along for a peep into university life, it has given the students something to think about over the next 2 years.


