MALTON ADVANCE IN EDUCATION

THE next 12 months would see the greatest advance in education ever made in the Malton area, said Sir William Worsley, chairman of Malton Grammar School governors, when he presided at the school speech day yesterday.

By this time next year, he said, the structural alterations being carried out at the school would be complete. It would mean that the school would be far better equipped than ever to give first-class grammar school education to a larger number of pupils.

Next year, the new Malton secondary modern school should be completed, so that at long last, there would be up-to-date secondary education available for all local children. "That is something we have all been looking forward to for a long time," he added.

Mr. S. Storey, M.P., vice-chairman of the governors, presented the prizes.

Referring to grumbles about the high cost of education, Mr. Storey said in fact, only three per cent. of the national income was spent on this service. Considering the potentialities of a sound education, he thought it was too little.

PARENTS' FAULT

Such poor results as were occasionally obtained were more likely to be the fault of parents than of the teachers and pupils.

Dealing with the opportunities for adult education and the competition from television, Mr. Storey said television controllers had a great social responsibility. If television was to be an excuse for feeding the family at regular intervals out of tins, the producers should, at any rate, devise programmes which were mentally stimulating and did not require merely passive attention.
